This year the New University in Exile Consortium, like the rest of the world, dealt with unprecedented challenges. COVID-19 has changed all of our lives, imposing uncertainty and isolation upon us all. Now, more than a year later many of our colleagues and friends around the world are still in the grips of this devastating pandemic.

Over the last year, we have seen authoritarian governments use the pandemic as a reason to further erode and limit academic freedom. The move to electronic platforms necessitated by the pandemic provided new avenues to censor or silence those advocating for fundamental human rights.

In the face of these unprecedented challenges, the New University in Exile Consortium has worked to be a welcoming refuge for the growing number of endangered exiled scholars hosted by our member institutions. As you will read, we have persevered, moving our face-to-face programming online whenever possible, and enriching our online programming such as our weekly Scholars' Seminar which has, from the start, been an important online activity for the Consortium. This has ensured that our intellectual community could continue to flourish.




The New University in Exile Consortium is based at The New School and now part of its Zolberg Institute on Migration and Mobility. We are an an expanding group of 31, soon to be 40 colleges and universities in the U.S., Canada, Germany, Jordan, and South Africa. Each institutional member is committed to hosting at least one exiled scholar every year and these exiled hosted scholars constitute our scholar cohort. We work with them individually and together to try and lessen the profound sense of dislocation which exiled scholars suffer and which adversely impacts their intellectual and personal lives.

Established in September 2018, the Consortium follows in the tradition of The New School's original University in Exile, which in 1933 became the home of rescued, largely Jewish endangered scholars from Germany and France. Today, the New University in Exile Consortium is hosting 40 exiled scholars from 14 countries.

In the last academic year we have added 12 additional exiled scholars to the Consortium. Since our launch in 2018 we have supported a total of 72 scholars.

Our members are currently hosting 40 endangered, exiled scholars funded by the Scholar Rescue Fund, Scholars at Risk, Einstein Foundation Berlin, Philipp Schwartz Initiative, & by individual universities and colleges.



Scholars come from Azerbaijan, Brazil, Cambodia, China, Democratic Republic of the Congo, India, Iran, Iraq, Poland, Syria, Turkey, Ukraine, Venezuela, and Yemen.

They are experts in: agriculture sciences, anthropology, archeology, filmmaking, economics, history, environmental science, law, linguistics, mathematics, migration studies, museum curation, medical science, philosophy, poetry, political science, psychology, and sociology.

Dr. Teng Biao is an exiled Chinese lawyer and human rights activist who continues to advocate against human rights abuses in China, despite the fact that he is attacked even here in the US. This winter, he was harassed by a group of Chinese government-allied protestors (the story was covered by The Washington Post) who picketed outside his home during the weeks he was teaching a coled online seminar sponsored by the Consortium titled, "Law, Justice and Human Rights in China." Despite personal costs, Dr. Teng Biao has remained a staunch defender of the principles of free speech and academic freedom.

WEEKLY SCHOLARS SEMINAR

The Scholars Seminar is the Consortium's longest running program. Meeting online each week for two hours, the seminar serves the dual purpose of exploring an academic subject chosen by the scholars, while also providing a time to come together and check in with one another.

SUMMER 2020: SERIES ON RACISM IN AMERICA

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Black Lives Matter Protest, Washington DC

During the summer of 2020, we witnessed the largest ever global protest against racial injustice and in support of the Black Lives Matter movement. Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, protestors around the world took to the streets and the conversation about racism in America moved to the forefront of the public consciousness. To Consortium scholars less familiar with the history of systematic racism in the United States, we felt it was important to dedicate time to exploring these events together.

Two of our hosted scholars. Simten Coşar and Selin Bengi Gümrükçü, organized a four-part series of discussions which addressed the state of police violence and ensuing protests in the United States. Together we explored the historical and contemporary dynamics of racial politics in the U.S. with a view to the past and present civil rights and social justice movements.



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The Consortium's member institutions are publicly committed to the belief that the academic community has both the responsibility and capacity to assist persecuted and endangered scholars, to help protect the intellectual resources that are jeopardized when universities and scholars are under assault, and to advocate for academic freedom around the world. To that end, we host public conferences and events which call attention to threats to academic freedom. Our conferences also provide a platform for scholars to present their work to the broader community.



CONSORTIUM SCHOLARS' IMPACT

Our scholars regularly engage with students, faculty, and their local academic communities bringing new and diverse perspectives which undoubtedly impact the discourse around social, moral, and political issues. Their work, including teaching courses, giving public lectures, and organizing public discussions encourages those around them to engage in conversations about issues they might otherwise not consider, and raises awareness about threats to academic freedom and free expression. 

The Library Access Initiative

The Library Access Initiative provides stranded endangered scholars with remote access to the electronic materials available via Consortium Member-Institution libraries. The New School is providing library access to 8 scholars from 3 countries: Jordan, Turkey, and Syria.

The Scholars participating via the New School also have access to all the electronic resources of the New York Public Library.

The Initiative is designed to allow stranded scholars to continue their research despite having been cut off from their academic institutions.



Gaudêncio Fidelis (pictured right) is a Brazilian curator and art historian who has curated and organized more than 50 exhibitions. He is a leading voice in the movement to maintain freedom of expression in the Brazilian art world.



Fidelis was forced to flee Brazil in 2019 after nearly two years of death threats, investigations, and denunciations which began when a right-wing extremist group claimed his exhibit, Queermuseu: Cartographies of Difference in Brazilian Art (pictured below), promoted pedophilia, zoophilia and blasphemy. Though the accusations were immediately dismissed by the public prosecutor, and the exhibit reopened in August 2018 in Rio de Janeiro, the intensity of the protests never ceased.
